

## **SERMON OUTLINE**

**SERMON TITLE:** The Problem of Procrastination

**SERMON REFERENCE:** Acts 24:24-27

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## 1) INTRODUCTION

- a) Do you have trouble with procrastination?
- b) Most of us are plagued with some form of procrastination.
  - i) But some of us have a form of procrastination that is actually harming us and doing great damage to us.
- c) Procrastination is more than the thief of time.
  - i) It is the grave of opportunity, and it may be the road to Hell.
- d) Many people will not be saved for three basic reasons:
  - i) Some will not be saved because they are out-and-out sinners.
    - (1) They don't want to believe.
    - (2) They hate God, Christ, the Bible, and the church.
    - (3) They don't intend to be saved.
  - ii) The second category of persons who will hear and not be saved are self-righteous people.
    - (1) They think the Gospel is for the thief, murderer, and prostitute, but not for them.
    - (2) They are nice, cultured people who live good lives, do good deeds, and are even religious.
      - (a) They don't see their need to be saved.
  - iii) The largest category of people who are lost and will not be saved are people who are procrastinators.
    - (1) They don't intend to go to Hell.
    - (2) They sincerely intend that one day they will be saved, but not today.
    - (3) They put it off and refuse to receive Christ now.
      - (a) They think that they will receive Him later on.
- e) The sin of procrastination has blasted more dreams, blighted more lives, wrecked more careers, and doomed more souls than perhaps any other sin.
- f) The Scripture that we will look at today deals with a man who procrastinated.
  - i) He put off giving his heart to Jesus Christ.
    - (1) In all likelihood, he is in Hell today.
- g) Acts 24:24-27
  - i) Paul was a prisoner in Caesarea.
  - ii) The Roman judge was a man named Felix.
    - (1) Felix had some religious proclivities and inclinations.
      - (a) He wanted to understand the faith concerning Jesus Christ.
      - (b) Felix wanted Paul to tell him about Jesus Christ.
  - iii) Paul preached a Christ-centered, pertinent message to Felix.
    - (1) The conviction of the Holy Spirit was so strong that Felix trembled.
      - (a) He was right at the threshold of salvation, but then he did something that many people do.
      - (b) Felix knew he was under conviction, but he wanted to wait for a better time, or what he called "a convenient season."
        - (i) And so, the devil trapped him; and today, he is in Hell.

- h) In today's message, we will look at three specific things from this passage of Scripture as we think about the problem with procrastination.
- 2) THE SERMON THAT CONVICTED HIM (ACTS 24:24-26)
  - a) Acts 24:24-25
    - i) When Felix called for Paul, he wanted Paul to tell him about Jesus.
    - ii) Paul preached a sermon that convicted Felix.
      - (1) "Felix trembled."
    - iii) Paul had three points in his sermon:
      - (1) Righteousness
      - (2) Temperance
      - (3) Judgment to come
        - (a) Paul took each of these points and expanded them and reasoned with Felix about these things.
  - b) The standard that Paul revealed:
    - i) The standard that God has set is absolute righteousness.
    - ii) Isaiah 64:6
      - (1) Felix may have been wrapped in royal robes, but God saw him dressed in filthy rags.
      - (2) In this verse, "filthy rags" literally means the bandages that a leper might wear and then discard.
        - (a) This is not what God thinks of the bad things that we do.
        - (b) This is what God thinks of the good things that we do apart from Christ.
          - (i) We will never be saved by doing good deeds.
    - iii) 2 Corinthians 5:21
      - (1) God made Jesus to be sin for us that we might become the righteousness of God.
        - (a) Self-righteousness prevails not in God's sight.
        - (b) The Lord Jesus Christ took our sins, carried them to the cross, and purchased forgiveness for us.
    - iv) The only way that righteousness can become ours is by faith.
      - (1) Romans 4:5
      - (2) Felix's righteousness was no good.
      - (3) God has provided righteousness in the Lord Jesus Christ, who took our sins to the cross and died for us.
        - (a) We will not get it by working.
    - v) The standard that Paul revealed was righteousness.
  - c) The sin that Paul revealed:
    - i) Acts 24:25
      - (1) The word "temperance" here literally means "self-control."
    - ii) Felix was a sensual man.
      - (1) The Bible says that he was with his wife Drusilla.
        - (a) Acts 24:24

- (2) Drusilla was one of the most beautiful women who ever lived.
  - (a) She was said to be the most beautiful woman of her day.
  - (b) She was one of the daughters of King Herod Agrippa.
- (3) Drusilla was married the first time when she was fourteen or fifteen.
  - (a) But when Felix set his eyes upon her, he stole her away from her husband.
- iii) Felix was a politician.
  - (1) What buttered his bread determined his conduct.
  - (2) One of the reasons why he talked with Paul was that he was hoping to get a bribe.
    - (a) He was hoping Paul would give him money that he might release him.
      - (i) No judge is supposed to do that.
      - (ii) Acts 24:26
  - (3) Later on, we see him pandering to the Jewish people.
    - (a) He crucified his conscience for public opinion.
    - (b) He was willing to content the Jewish people, not that he did it according to principle.
- iv) Felix was a sinner by nature, by birth, by practice, and by choice.
- d) The summons that Paul revealed:
  - i) Acts 24:25
    - (1) Righteousness, temperance, and judgement to come.
      - (a) Here is what God demands, and here is what you are; therefore, a judgment is coming.
        - (i) You will face God.
    - (2) It was important for this man to understand this.
      - (a) Here he was on the throne living high, wide, and handsome.
        - (i) He had power, pomp, circumstance, and luxury.
    - (3) What Paul was saying to Felix was for him to not judge by appearance or by what happens now, but to judge by what is going to happen.
      - (a) Judgment is not now; judgment is coming.
  - ii) God doesn't judge an unsaved person now.
    - (1) Do the unsaved get in trouble because of their sin?
      - (a) Anyone gets in trouble because of their sin.
        - (i) If someone lives a life of promiscuity, then they may get a terrible, debilitating disease.
        - (ii) If someone takes drugs or alcohol, then it will take its effect in their body.
          - 1. This is not primarily the judgment of God; this is just a built-in judgment.
            - a. Every kick has a kickback, but the true judgment is coming.
    - (2) One of the most terrifying verses in the Bible is Romans 2:5.
      - (a) There is a day of wrath and a day of judgment coming.

- (i) People with hard hearts just simply store it up.
- e) Paul preached a stern sermon.
  - i) He revealed a standard, a sin, and a summons that judgment was coming.
  - ii) Felix was a man whose hands were filthy with the sins of the flesh and whose heart was in need of the Savior.
  - iii) When Paul finished his sermon, Felix trembled.
    - (1) Acts 24:25
    - (2) He wasn't afraid of Paul; he was under Holy Spirit conviction.
    - (3) Acts 16:29
      - (a) The Philippian jailer trembled, and he believed on the Lord Jesus Christ and was saved.
    - (4) Felix came right to the threshold of salvation.
      - (a) He was under the conviction of sin.
      - (b) But he said that when he had a convenient season, he would call for Paul.
        - (i) Acts 24:25

## 3) THE PRESSURES THAT CONFRONTED HIM (ACTS 24:25)

- a) The devil never gives up anyone or anything without a struggle.
  - i) When the Holy Spirit of God moved in to convict Felix, the devil moved in to confront him.
    - (1) The devil did not want Felix to be saved.
- b) There were three mighty forces that warred against this man's soul.
  - i) They are the same three enemies that we all face:
    - (1) The world
    - (2) The flesh
    - (3) The devil
- c) The world worked on him and pressured him.
  - i) The world warred on this man.
    - (1) Felix was in Caesarea in a place of prominence, power, position, and praise.
    - (2) In order for him to be saved, he had to humble himself.
      - (a) He had to admit that he was wrong and that he needed Christ.
  - ii) A lot of people get under conviction.
    - (1) But the devil tells them to maintain their pride.
      - (a) Don't admit that you have a need.
  - iii) Pride sits in the seat with every sinner.
    - (1) We call this worldliness.
- d) The flesh worked on him and pressured him.
  - i) He was living a sensuous life.
  - ii) He was taking bribes.
  - iii) He had all of these pleasures of the flesh that he might be asked to give up.

- (1) The only thing that God will ever ask us to give up are the things that will hurt us.
- (2) If it will make us healthy, happy, wholesome, and holy, then God says to help yourself to them.
  - (a) Psalm 84:11
- e) The devil worked on him and pressured him.
  - i) Acts 24:25
    - (1) We can read between the lines and see how Satan whispered in his ear to just think about it.
      - (a) That it wasn't convenient right now to make a decision.
  - ii) Many souls have been sent to Hell because they simply postponed the day of salvation.
  - iii) There was real pressure upon this man, and he simply said to Paul, "Not now, later."
- f) All of these pressures you, too, will feel if you are not saved.
- 4) THE PRESUMPTION THAT CONDEMNED HIM (ACTS 24:25, 27)
  - a) Acts 24:27
    - i) This tells us that Felix never did get saved; He never received Christ.
      - (1) History tells us that Felix died by suicide.
    - ii) The name "Felix" means "happy."
      - (1) But he had no happiness; he had no joy.
  - b) Felix made the following three tragic miscalculations:
    - i) That convenience would come.
      - (1) He had the idea that now wasn't the best time, and tomorrow was a better time.
        - (a) But tomorrow is not a better time; now is the best time.
      - (2) If we wait until tomorrow, then we will lose today.
        - (a) We tell people to get right with God because they may die.
        - (b) Instead, we need to tell people to get right with God because they may live with Jesus.
          - (i) Being a Christian is not some penalty that we pay in order to get to Heaven.
          - (ii) In this life, there is joy and peace in knowing the Lord Jesus Christ.
        - (c) When Felix went for the world, the flesh, and the devil, it brought him no happiness; it brought him no joy.
          - (i) His life ended in misery.
      - (3) Tomorrow may not come.
        - (a) Proverbs 27:1
        - (b) We don't know when we are going to die.
          - (i) We are closer to death now than we have ever been.
        - (c) People die every day.

- (i) Some die by disease, disaster, decay (they just get old), and some by design.
- (ii) Sometimes people die young.
- (d) 1 Chronicles 29:15
- (e) Job7:6
- (f) Psalm 39:5
- (g) Psalm 102:3
- (h) Psalm 102:11
- (i) How unwise it was for Felix to say that he would wait for a "convenient time."
  - (i) Convenience may not come.
  - (ii) Acts 24:25
- (4) Jesus may come at any moment.
  - (a) Matthew 24:42
  - (b) Matthew 24:44
  - (c) Are you ready if the trumpet should sound and Jesus should come right now?
    - (i) The Bible says, "Be ready."
  - (d) When we say, "I don't think He is coming today," then that is the best sign that He might.
- ii) That conviction would continue.
  - (1) Acts 24:25
    - (a) Felix was under Holy Spirit conviction.
  - (2) Conviction is of the Lord, but the Bible says that His Spirit shall not always strive with a man.
    - (a) Genesis 6:3
  - (3) We can say no to God and that conviction can pass away.
    - (a) Hebrews 3:7-8
    - (b) If the Holy Spirit of God speaks to us and we say no, then it will harden our hearts.
      - (i) Each time we say no, our hearts get a little harder.
      - (ii) There will come a time when our hearts will be so hard that the Holy Spirit of God cannot and will not speak to us.
    - (c) Hosea 4:17
      - (i) Here was a man who had lived in idolatry and sin for so long that he was married to his sin.
    - (d) In Romans 1, we read three times where God gave them up, God gave them up, and God gave them over.
    - (e) John 12:37, 39
      - (i) Verse 37 says that they would not believe.
      - (ii) Then, verse 39 says that they could not believe.
    - (f) Isaiah 55:6
  - (4) We cannot trifle with the Holy Spirit.

- (5) We can bandage our eyes and keep a bandage on so long that when we take that bandage off, we will be blind.
- iii) That conflicts would cease.
  - (1) Felix thought that somehow it would be easier later than it would be now.
    - (a) The devil never gives up on anyone or anything without a fight.
  - (2) There will never be a better time for you to be saved than now.
    - (a) Hebrews 3:7-8
    - (b) Proverbs 27:1
    - (c) 2 Corinthians 6:2
- c) When you are waiting on a convenient season, remember the following:
  - i) Tomorrow, you will have less time to repent in.
  - ii) Tomorrow, you will have more sin to repent of.
  - iii) Tomorrow, you will have a harder heart to repent of.
- d) Hebrews 3:7-8

## 5) CONCLUSION

- a) What was the mistake that Felix made?
  - i) That convenience will come.
  - ii) That conviction will continue.
  - iii) That conflict will cease.
    - (1) He just simply put salvation off, hoping that tomorrow would be the time to come to the Lord.
      - (a) It would not be so.
- b) Isaiah 55:6
  - i) The Holy Spirit says, "Today."
  - ii) The Word of God says, "Today."
  - iii) Experience says, "Today."
    - (1) Come to Jesus today.
- c) Do you know Jesus personally? If not, you can pray to Him today by asking Him to come into your life.
- d) Call upon Jesus today. Repent (turn) from your sins, and turn to Jesus. Ask Him to forgive you of your sins, and acknowledge Him as Lord of your life.
  - i) Romans 3:23
  - ii) Romans 10:9-10
  - iii) Romans 10:13
  - iv) Acts 16:31
  - v) John 3:16
